

A Touch Ticklish

The books chosen for this list are linked by a certain ticklishness – but that’s where the similarity ends. Humour nowadays is often ‘in your face’ and a number of the titles on this list are pretty rude as well as laugh-aloud funny. However, if you’re not keen on swearing and gags about sex and bodily functions, you’ll find a more gentle type of comedy here, too – and one or two that might touch a raw nerve.

Use this list to lighten up your reading life. Introduce your sense of humour to something new. Outrageously funny, light and witty, subtly comic – they're all here for the taking.

Read the introductions to each book and decide for yourself. Be generous, be daring – you can always swap the book for something else if it’s not your cup of tea. But if you don’t try... you’ll never know!

Three to Get Deadly by Janet Evanovich

Meet Stephanie Plum, bounty hunter extraordinaire; paid to bring in losers who jump bail – the bad guys. So how come she’s after ‘uncle’ Mo Bedemier, Trenton’s answer to Mr Softy? Has she finally flipped? Her parents certainly think so; and, what’s worse, that ‘too sexy for his own good’ cop, Joe Morelli, is enjoying every minute of it. If you like your crime sassy, streetwise and hilarious, Janet Evanovich is simply the best.



Whistling for Elephants by Sandi Toksvig

Ten-year-old Dorothy is alone in the world. Her parents seem to inhabit another planet, and the local kids think she’s weird. She passes the time mooching around the neighbourhood until one day she discovers a small, run-down zoo. Sandi Toksvig is well known for her radio and TV comedy; here she proves she can do it on paper too. Expect bizarre characters, hilarious one-liners, but also some serious issues simmering beneath the surface.

Round Ireland with a Fridge by Tony Hawks

Anyone who could contemplate hitch-hiking around Ireland with a fridge in tow must be good for a laugh – or very drunk when he agreed to do it! The result is a very silly, but extremely funny, adventure. Read it as an alternative view (albeit restricted by the dimensions of the fridge) to the usual stuff generated by the tourist industry about the ‘Emerald Isle’. Much more fun than a travel guide.



Horse Heaven by Jane Smiley

This is a book set in the US, amongst the racing fraternity, where the dogs and horses vie with the humans for ‘personality of the year’. (Watch out for Eileen – a Jack Russell with attitude.) Jane Smiley manipulates a massive cast of characters with remarkable dexterity; her ready wit and abundance of goodwill keeping her well on course. The story flows effortlessly – it’s relaxed, informal and very funny. Even if you hate horses – take a gamble. This one’s a dead cert!

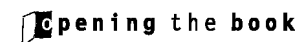
